



Have you ever seen a two or three-year-old child recite the presidents of the United States or do some other amazing feat? You were excited at how brilliant this child was. Early Childhood Learning experts have found that the fastest learning period in a baby's life is between birth and three years old. Tens of thousands of brain connections are being formed in the baby's brain by introducing the baby to new things and by talking and interacting with him/her.

Babies love to learn. Every interaction you have with your baby is a learning experience for them. Years ago I read a book by Glenn Doman that said the only reason babies didn't learn to read sooner was because the print was too small. I started teaching babies in the church nursery while we were in Bible School. I saw wonderful results using big letters babies could see.

We have been duped to think that kids can't learn to read until they are five or six. That's when their learning begins to slow down! If we wait till then, the best learning years of their life are past. We think some kids are gifted and others are not when the truth is that the gifted kids probably got more attention from their parents and more stimulation to learn at an early age. Babies start learning while still in the womb. They remember your voice and what you read and sing to them over and over. Talk to your baby about everything. Explain what you are doing. People say don't talk over kids heads. Why not? Talking over their heads causes them to reach up! You don't want to talk down to kids." Talking to your baby in regular conversation develops the baby's vocabulary.

In 2010, my vision of writing children's books began to explode and Big Letter Books for Children was born. Children who learn at an early age are very happy, creative children who continue to learn at a faster rate for the rest of their lives.

The difference between Big Letter Books for Children and books already on the market is that most children's books have small type and big pictures so somebody can read to them. When children are read to they focus on the pictures and not the words. Big Letter Books for Children has large print and pictures are between the pages—not on the same page. Then when you point to each word as you read your child will begin to remember the words when the book is read over and over. The story can be reinforced as you talk about the picture between the story pages. We cannot comprehend the wonderful effect of teaching toddlers how to read the Bible. This is part of "Training up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." (Proverbs 22:6)

In a presentation by Dr. Bob Titzer, developer of the Your Baby Can Read Early Language Learning Program, he interviews his 13-year-old daughter who learned to read using Glen Doman's Methods before she was one year old. At the time of the interview she was 16, a sophomore in college and read thick novels in two hours. The amazing rewards of teaching your children from babies are beyond comprehension.
